Syd joined our Thursday tramping group during 2012 and has been a very regular, enthusiastic and loyal member since then. When Merv Matthews retired from his leadership of the



Thursday group Syd stepped up to manage our tramping roster and weekly emails, always ensuring things were running smoothly. He became our leader but, if anyone should suggest that title to him, he would have modestly demurred. He was also very attentive to keeping our annual Christmas get-together going and he and Audrey hosted some of these at their house and lovely garden.

Syd was one of the fittest and strongest in our group but he was also very caring. He would often stay back with any tail enders that might be slower or struggling with injury. He was very inclusive, making sure that anyone who wanted to join in on a day's tramp felt welcomed and looked after.

Our thoughts are very much with Audrey, also a club member and a regular and supportive Thursday tramper. We are devastated for her loss. Back on a Thursday tramp in February 2016, during a tramp to Waiopehu hut, Syd and Audrey announced their engagement. This had been a well-kept secret and was a huge suprise to us all. Syd brought out his special whiskey fruit cake to celebrate. It must have been heavy! The marriage that followed was such a happy one. The Thursday trampers were all invited and those that attended still reminisce about the laughter and stories told. We all have noticed the joy their marriage brought to them both in the following years.

Syd, our Thursday tramping group, and all who knew you, are going to miss you immensely. Again our thoughts, love and sympathy are with Audrey and both their families.

24-26 January, 2023: Ruapehu Rambles

Rain started just as 9 of the 11 of us in the van set off from the Turoa Road for Lake Surprise and that, combined with a cold wind, meant the pace down hill was very fast initially. Fortunately, both the rain and the pace eased off once we began to climb though it was overcast the whole day with intermittent views of the top of Mt Ruapehu. The mostly dirt track winds its way up and down through jumbles of rocks until it reaches the Cascades. Here multiple streams pour down over smooth rock covered with white deposits. As

we crossed one, we spied Cheryl Dawson, Marilyn Hewitt, Carolyn Brodie and Robyn Symonds who had travelled separately. They were having a break to consider whether to go further because the track disappears over the edge of the rock into "nothing" which is quite intimidating. We joined them for an early lunch and eventually they all decided to return to their car. Appearances can be deceiving because it was not too hard to find foot holds in the rock as we climbed down to more level ground.

From there the track enters some bush, meanders down a steep gully and across to Mangaturuturu Hut where we had a second lunch. Then we crossed the Mangaturuturu River and climbed up



to Lake Surprise which turned out to be the lake we had spotted from the Cascades. We retraced our steps

and arrived back at the van about 5.30 pm to find Anja and Helen waiting patiently. Because they had both been to Lake Surprise recently they had opted for an alternative walk to Blyth Hut and then up to the edge of the ski field. We arrived at the Lodge around 6.30 pm in drizzle and 'dined' around 8 pm.

Heavy rain was forecast for later on Wednesday so we opted for sheltered walks around Whakapapa Village, namely the Silica Rapids and the Whakapapanui tracks and then we walked down the road to view the Tawhai Falls where we had lunch. Ken kindly dropped us off and drove the van to Whakapapa Village and walked up to meet us on the Silica Rapids track then doubled back to get the van while we walked to the Falls. After watching a film about volcanoes at the DoC Centre we headed back to the Top o' Bruce car park for a visit to Meads Wall for some while others returned directly to the lodge.

On Thursday the group breakfasted, cleaned up and packed up very efficiently so we were walking along the Mangatepopo Track by 9.10 am. It was clear but there was a cold wind blowing as we climbed up Devils Staircase along with a relatively small number of tourists. We had a lunch stop just past Red Crater where we had a good view of the Emerald and Blue Lakes. Then we set off across Central Crater where Ken, of course, had to climb to the top of the little hill in the middle of the crater. The rest of us took a fairly direct route across to and up the ridge running more or less north from Tongariro. Once on top we had good views



of Lake Taupo and surrounds and made our way around the side of Tongariro above the baby Whanganui River. There was some debate as to the exact route we should take down as it looked like there were some steep gullies to cross. However we managed to negotiate these without too much difficulty and eventually made our way on to the ridge that runs above and parallel to the Tongariro Crossing Track. The group split up as we approached Mangatepopo Hut with Christine leading the way on a diagonal track down towards the gully while others took a more vertical route. We all met up at the bottom and climbed up to the hut for a short break then walked back to the van, arriving about 5.30 pm.

Then a burger stop in Ohakune and back to Palmerston North by 9.30 pm. We were Ken Mercer (driver), Lorraine Barr, Mary Mercer, Leonie Lowndes, Christine Finnigan, Graham Irvine plus Marion Beadle, Anja Scholz and photographer, Helen Peek.

Wednesday 1 February, 2023: Panatewaewae Ridge and Stream via Carl's track

My interest in this loop followed a discussion some of the Wednesday group had with a guy, now known to be Carl, while the rest of us were up Waitewaewae, a couple of years ago. Carl reported that although going up and down the Panatewaewae Ridge track was an OK tramp, a better option was to do a loop including the Panatewaewae Ridge track but then going further to the 527m high point and then to follow a well trodden, but largely unmarked, track down to the Panatewaewae Stream and back downstream to complete a loop.

On February 1st, 23 trampers met at the North Manakau road end to complete this loop. We began with a short walk along the former extension of North Manakau Road to find the start of the Panatewaewae Ridge track. Although it's marked with a piece of tape, the start is easy to miss: we have missed it in the past. A couple more people planned to do a part loop and head back the way they came. Most of the Panatewaewae Ridge track is a gentle gradient, rising through regenerating native bush. Carl, whom I have met a couple of times following our initial meeting, said he can remember being driven up this track in 1972, when there was still some milling occurring - the bush has regrown well since then. It was perfect tramping weather, so we all made pretty fast time to the clearing at the 527m point to enjoy morning tea. The view from this summit provided glimpses of the area south of Levin and of Lake Papaitonga through the rapidly growing pine trees.

The next leg of this tramp, initially through pine trees, then goes up and down along an old 4WD track, beyond the end of the track marked on our maps, to a 437m high point. Here we made our turn on to Carl's track, which drops down a ridge, through nice, fern-dominant regenerating forest to a grassy clearing, where we stopped for a second morning tea. A marker then guided us to a track that leads to a grassy expanse on the edge of the Panatewaewae Stream. The track then heads downstream, crossing the water several times, as the stream snakes its way down the valley.

Lunch was enjoyed at a shady, but dryish spot on the banks of the stream. After lunch we continued

downstream enjoying the short bush-clad cut offs and subsequent stream crossings. Commiserations to the people who had an unexpected dip. Following the last stream crossing near confluence the of the Panatewaewae and Waikawa Streams, we headed back, across the old DoC carpark, up and over the slip that cut off access to the carpark and back to the road end. The loop took us around 6 hours. Carl is right about this loop tramp - it is a really nice tramp on a fine day.

Thanks to: Carl for telling us about this loop and for the



work he is doing in this area opening up tracks, to Margaret for driving the minibus and for looking after her passengers and to Bill, Jenny and Robbie for bringing their cars.

Thursday 2 February, 2023: Oroua River towards Irongate Gorge

Down the Ōroua without a rou....

A quick language lesson for starters: The name Ōroua, roughly translated, means: a place of dredging for shellfish Ō (place of) -rou (dredge for shellfish) -a (some sort of activity marker/verb marker)

Nine of us intrepid shellfish dredgers got to the carpark for Alice Nash Memorial Hut (ANMH)/Iron Gates, only to find that we'd left the dredge behind. Not to be deterred, we nonetheless proceeded, dressed in sun hats, sun shirts, sun shorts, sun boots, sun gaiters, and slathered in sunscreen, first of all to the ANMH. The decision to have morning tea at the hut, and not by the river, was made to lengthen the trip (which wasn't going to make it onto the 'Top Ten Longest Thursday Trips



of all Times' list by a fair margin) by about 15 minutes. We'd also only tramped a modest 30 minutes by the time we got to the hut.

Alas, strengthened we carried on down to the river which looked in about similar flow as two weeks ago at the recce - as per dictionary, short for reconnaissance (just thought I'd throw in another free language lesson). - With a "looking good", River Runners Chris and Syd were off down stream as trusty trackers, leading the rest of us on the true left bank a little ways along. Soon, however, we had to start crossing the Ōroua, and while in very manageable flow we still had to scout for the best crossing places. Seeing Tony submerged to halfway up his shorts meant most of us more vertically challenged folks tried to find a better place to get to the other side. Avoiding the rapids and opting for the slightly deeper but slower flowing parts proved the ticket. We negotiated the bottom of a couple of slips and waded mostly up to just over knee deep through pools and puddles.

The cold water was definitely a winner given the temperature - the tree ferns, heat and cicadas made for a



near tropical backdrop to our journey. At some point one crossing was a bit deeper and swifter, so Margaret gave us a bit of a refresher for 'River Crossing 101', and we linked up. Good to test what felt comfortable and how to support each other – thanks Margaret. Before we knew it we had come close to the confluence of the Ōroua and the Umutoi (couldn't find a translation, could be named after a person) Stream, and did a final cooling crossing before we had lunch and a peek down the Iron Gates waterfalls and gorge.

Suitably refreshed we immediately lost all that freshness ascending steeply through the pine forest of the stoat track back towards the main path. A look out at the Umutoi waterfall, but the leading party did not

deviate on the (5 minutes max!) detour to the slip view point! So another trip will have to be planned for that.

When we hit the main drag we dragged out the tramp a bit more with Margaret outlining her overnight trip for next Thursday/Friday, which will lead to an interesting place at the volcanoes – the Ruapehu Black-backed Seagull Colony <u>https://blog.forestandbird.org.nz/mountains-of-sea-birds/</u>

Soon after we trudged back up the grassy last 500m (5000m?) to the carpark, to make this a swift and fun 4 hour river run tramp. As I write this, the rain is bucketing down. And while in Spain it falls mainly on the plain, in New Zealand it yet again did not fall on the trampers Syd (main organizer for this trip), Chris (main river tracker), Margaret (river crossing coach), Geoff (newbee and club-member-to-be), Tony (best river crossing 'anchor'), William (survivor Ōroua), Darlene, Audrey and Anja (three mouseketeers).

As Jinny unfortunately could not lead this day trip, there will hopefully be another opportunity for her to experience the shellfish dredging, or maybe just river splashing, in and out of the Ōroua.

Wednesday 8 February, 2023: Castle Rock

With rain falling at Memorial Park, we ventured off to the only dry place in the lower North Island (hopefully). Within 15 minutes the rain had eased then stopped. The Oroua and Rangitikei rivers were in full flood. We took a forestry road close to Santoft that led straight to the coast, parking 100m back from a large grassy car park (due to surface water). We walked south, parallel to the beach through trees and shrubbery, until we reached a stream that was a little deep to cross. The track was sheltered. We headed back through macrocarpas trying to find a way to the beach but ended up back at the car park and formal beach access. The dunes appear to be infested with what looks like stunted Tasmanian Blackwood?? A real weed! This part of the beach is part of the Te Araroa trail.

The beach was pretty windy so we only walked as far south as the possible site of the Fusilier wreck from 1884 (buried or in the dunes).



Our next adventure was to Scott's Ferry, past the restored barge and through the township where every house has a name: Toddle Inn, Hilt Inn, Breeze Inn, Fish Inn to name a few. We walked past a tidal estuary and along a 4 wheel drive track behind the dunes to the river estuary and mouth (more distant) where we lunched. A couple of Spoonbill and a flock of Canadian geese weren't too far off. It was then out to the sea and back along the beach with the wind behind us. This time the estuary had Pied Stilt. With 10km under our belt plus a bit of sand we retreated to the Woodshed cafe near Sanson. Thanks to Wendy and Jenny for driving and to everyone for getting out and about on a less than perfect day. It was made very enjoyable with good company and a few laughs!

Beechleaves, June, 1958: Notes on Cave Carvings Near Waverley

The cave is really a washout of vertical sandstone, 24 feet long by 8 feet high and 8 feet deep. The back portion which is almost vertical is the carved part. It has probably been used by the Māori either as a shelter or resting place.

Most of the back of the cave was covered with relief work, though time has almost effaced it and recently it has been mutilated. The local Māori people seem to have been ignorant of its existence.

On both side of the carvings are what seem to be long lizards standing erect on their tails, which are bent to the left in order to support the body. The mouths are wide open and in them is a long oval body. At the bottom left there is what looks like an eel or serpent wriggling along wit neither head nor tail, these having possibly been worn away by the weather.

The middle portion is made up of strange objects curved in various ways and two of them show the spiral which is distinctive of Māori carvings.

These carvings differ markedly in design from South Island rock paintings, are apparently unique.
